MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR



The recent adoption of the 2009-2013 Financial Plan was just the start of the City's focus on our finances this year. In the second half of 2009, we'll be reviewing our core services and looking at new revenue opportunities and financial strategies that will lessen the impact of the economic downturn on our taxpayers.

We'll also be developing a strategy to address the "infrastructure gap" – the lack of funds set aside to replace aging infrastructure, such as pipes and roads, in 20 to 30 years. It's similar to saving up to replace the roof on your home. We need to start saving now for these large future expenses, and Council is taking the bold step of thinking beyond our three-year terms to address the long-term needs of our community.

This kind of long-term planning is critical to Port Coquitlam's future health and prosperity. You might have already heard about our other major planning efforts this year, including an Environmental Strategic Plan, Heritage Strategic Plan and Corporate Strategic Plan. And early next year, we'll embark on a Master Transportation Plan.

There will be plenty of opportunities for the community to get involved and provide input for all of these plans, not to mention next year's financial planning process.

We're always looking for new ways to engage the community, both in setting the direction of our City and in maximizing our City services. For example, we're making greater use of online surveys, and we recently launched my new blog at www.portcoquitlam.ca/mayor. Keep an eye on our website for more opportunities to connect with your City.

You can start getting more involved right now. Get out this summer and enjoy everything your beautiful City has to offer, from fun community events to facilities such as parks, pools and trails.

City begins environmental planning process

Will your children have the quality of life you did? How will climate change affect your life? Is clean water important? How should we protect our green spaces?

The City of Port Coquitlam wants to be a leader in protecting the environment, and is now developing EnviroPlan, an Environmental Strategic Plan that will guide our decisions and our actions in achieving this goal.

This new strategic plan will consider current and future environmental trends, new legislation, best practices in environmental management from other municipalities, financial considerations, and coordination of City efforts with those of the public and other stakeholders. The goal is effective



management of local environmental priorities, including corporate environmental impact.

Areas the plan will cover include:

- Habitat and biodiversity
- Climate change and energy
- Air quality, noise and light pollution
- Water, wastewater and stormwater
- Solid waste, materials and resources
- Land use, transportation and development
- Food and agriculture

Public consultation is a major component of the planning process. To date, an online survey and interactive Environmental Forum have been conducted.

2009-2013 FINANCIAL PLANNING PROCESS

The City of Port Coquitlam recently adopted its 2009-2013 Financial Plan, a critical planning document that outlines City spending and revenues for five years. The City's goal throughout the process was to meet the City's commitments with the lowest possible impact on taxpayers.

Factors affecting the 2009 budget

- Mandated payroll increases and police inflation costs.
- Revenue losses and cost increases related to the economic downturn, including:
 - reduced development revenues,
 - reduced investment income, and
 - increases in the cost of recycling due to the global recyclable market.
- Funding of a share of nine new RCMP officers, part of the City's long-term commitment to reducing the officer-to-citizen ratio.
- Costs relating to the Coast Meridian Overpass (a commitment the City entered into prior to the economic downturn), which amount to a \$34 tax increase in 2009.

Measures taken to reduce the impact on taxpayers

- Revenue enhancements, including new RCMP fees and increases in engineering fees, recreation fees and parking fees \$185,600
- Utilizing funds from 2008 surplus \$142,000
- Delay filling a vacant manager position in Development Services \$120,000
- Reduced infrastructure funding envelopes \$119,500
- Other cuts and deferrals \$55,000
- Reduced overtime costs \$20,500
- Total: \$642,600**

After these measures were taken, the City's 2009 budget included a 6.9% property tax increase, which amounts to \$110.30 for an average single-family home assessed at \$493,000. The combined increase to utility charges (water, sewer and garbage) came to 8.7%, or \$60.66. Included in that figure is a \$12 garbage levy increase, which is substantially lower than neighbouring cities.

Planning for 2010 and beyond

The 2010-2014 Financial Plan process has already begun, with a core services overview to look for opportunities for savings and efficiencies. As we look to the future, key considerations include making sustainable reductions that don't damage the City's long-term financial position, and the need to save for the future replacement of aging infrastructure such as roads and sewers.

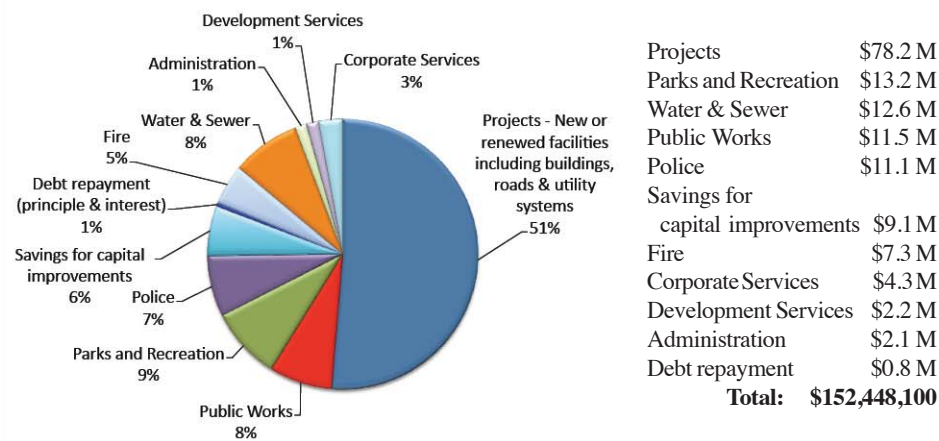

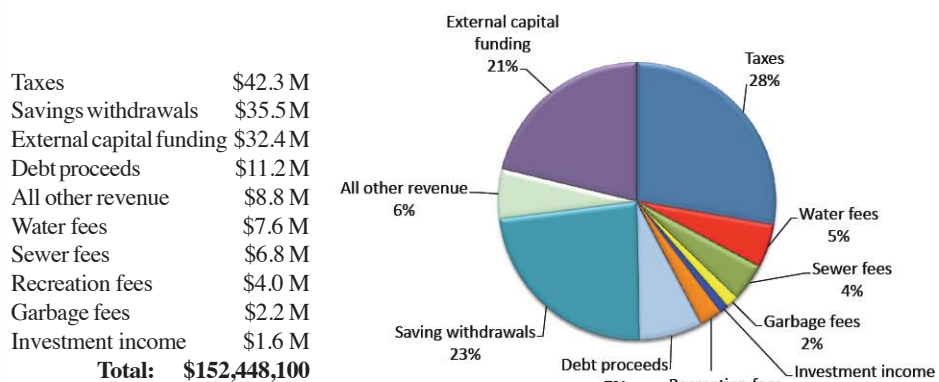

CAPITAL PROJECTS FOR 2009

To many of us, the most anticipated document in the budget is the list of capital projects to be constructed in our community each year.

Preferred projects by the residents are often recreational in nature, or they address a problem such as transportation or safety. This year, the City of Port Coquitlam is spending \$75.6 million on various capital projects, including the Coast Meridian Overpass.

After funding the Coast Meridian Overpass in 2009, the City has dedicated

the remaining capital funds to the upkeep of our large assets and infrastructure.

CITY OF PORT COQUITLAM PROPERTY TAXES ARE DUE THURSDAY, JULY 2, 2009

To avoid penalties, Port Coquitlam property owners must ensure their property taxes are paid by July 2 – even if they have not received a tax notice.

Late payment penalties: A 5% penalty will be added to 2009 current property taxes outstanding after July 2, 2009. A further 5% penalty will be applied after Aug. 17, 2009.

Six ways to pay your property taxes in Port Coquitlam

1. PAY AT YOUR BANK

Save time. Pay your taxes and other bills while banking.

2. PAY BY PHONE OR INTERNET

Check with your bank or credit union to see if it offers this service. You can also claim your Home Owner Grant at www.portcoquitlam.ca/e-hog.

3. *PAY BY MAIL

Mail your cheque or money order to City of Port Coquitlam, 2580 Shaughnessy Street, Port Coquitlam BC V3C 2A8.

4. *24-HOUR DROP OFF

Drop your payment in the mail slot to the right of the main entrance to City Hall.

5. *PAY IN PERSON

Bring your payment to the Tax Office on the main floor of City Hall from Monday to Friday (excluding statutory holidays), 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. *Extended hours from June 26 to July 2: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.* Please be prepared to wait in line.

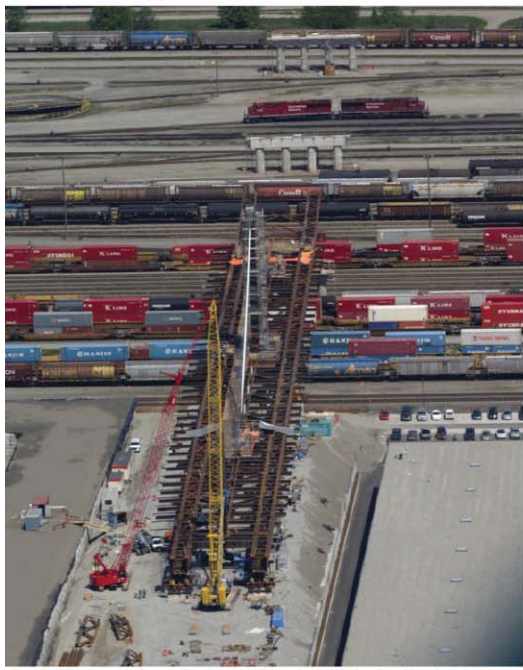

CMO push-launch continues over summer

Construction of the Coast Meridian Overpass (CMO) reached another milestone in June, with the record-breaking push-launch of a 125-metre-long section of the bridge that will link the two sides of Port Coquitlam.

The push-launch process uses hydraulic jacks to push the five sections of the deck structure – each the size of a Canadian football field – into place on rollers. Each installed section becomes a platform for the installation of the next piece.

The push-launch completed in June is the longest push-launch to date in B.C.

The three remaining push-launches will continue through August, followed by installation of deck panels and railings, pouring of the deck slab and other works.

The City's largest-ever transportation project, the 580-metre-long CMO will feature four lanes, sidewalks and bike lanes when it opens in early 2010. For more information, visit www.portcoquitlam.ca/cmo.

1 cart TWO USES

Are you filling your green waste cart with both yard and kitchen waste?

Are you getting the most use out of your green waste cart? Since July 2008, Port Coquitlam residents have been able to put compostable kitchen waste – such as vegetable/fruit scraps and coffee grounds – into their green waste carts for year-round pickup.

Statistics show that from the program's start on July 15, 2008 until May 31, 2009, residents set out 6,151 tonnes of garbage for collection, compared to 6,627 tonnes during the same period the previous year. While that's a 7% reduction, there's still room for improvement – a Metro Vancouver study reports that compostable kitchen waste makes up 16.5% of our garbage.

Benefits include less garbage going to the landfill and lower disposal costs for taxpayers. It's simple to take part. Just collect kitchen waste in a lidded pail under the sink and empty it in your green waste cart when full. For details, visit www.portcoquitlam.ca/greenwaste.



The BEAR facts...

- **Nine bears were killed** in Port Coquitlam last year after they became habituated to human food sources, such as garbage.
- There were more than **800 bear sightings** in Port Coquitlam last year – up from 224 in 2006.

It's everyone's responsibility to be Bear Aware

- Urban bear activity is increasing because of encroachment of their natural habitat and the availability of garbage and other unnatural food sources.
- Help stop bears from developing a taste for human food sources, which puts both the bears and our community at risk.
- Keep your garbage, fruit trees, bird feeders and other attractants out of the reach of bears, especially during the summer.

Don't waste a DROP!

What are you doing to conserve water this summer?

Saving water not only safeguards the environment, but it also protects your pocketbook from rising utility bills. Here are some ways you can help protect this precious resource:

Follow the sprinkling regulations from June 1 to September 30:

Sprinkling is only allowed from 4-9 am and 7-10 pm.

- Wednesday & Saturday: EVEN-numbered houses
- Thursday & Sunday: ODD-numbered houses

Be water-friendly outdoors:

- If washing your car, use a bucket and hose with automatic shut-off nozzle.
- Sweep sidewalks and patios rather than hosing them off.

Be water-friendly indoors:

- Do only full loads in the washing machine and dishwasher.
- Turn off the tap when not in use, and install low-flow plumbing fixtures (find out about our rebate program at www.portcoquitlam.ca/green).

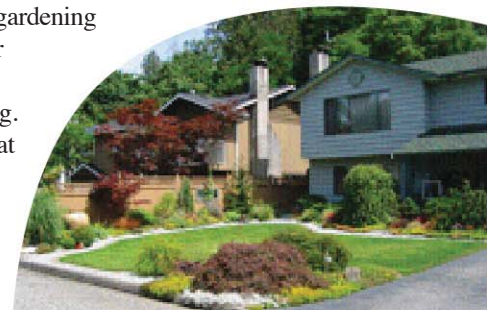
Nominate for the Pride of PoCo Garden Awards
